SUBJECT: FY 2012 – 2016 Proposed Capital Improvement Program

I am pleased to present to the Planning Commission the Proposed FY 2012-2016 Capital Improvement Program (CIP). What is being presented to the Planning Commission reflects what we know at this time regarding the City's total revenue and expenditure needs for FY 2012, and should be considered a **DRAFT**. There are still many unknowns, principally, how our revenues are projected to perform in FY 2012, and how additional State cuts will impact the City, not only on the revenue side but what expenditures will the City be expected to pick up if the State passes along more unfunded mandates. Until staff has a complete picture for the total budget, the 5 year CIP will remain a work in progress and could see adjustments between now and when the Proposed Budget is presented to Council in March.

Staff looks forward to the upcoming discussion with the Planning Commission on this draft 5 year plan. FY 2012 - 2016 Capital Improvement Program Development Process

The CIP process begins in August of each year when the City departments are asked to submit their CIP projects to the Budget Office. As departments are preparing their CIP requests, they are asked to rank their projects based on a set of nine fixed criteria. This criteria not only helps the department think about the type of requests they are submitting, but serves as a key factor when the CIP Budget Development Committee begins to discuss the projects as a whole, since generally requests far outweigh available funding.

As part of last year's process, the City Planning Commission developed a list of five priorities coming from the City of Charlottesville's Comprehensive Plan to be used for ranking new and modified CIP submissions. These priorities were again used for the FY 2012 – 2016 CIP Review Process to assist with the ranking of the CIP submissions. The priorities identified by the Planning Commission for the FY 2012 -2016 CIP Review Process are:

- Improve, expand, and enhance the park system to meet diverse user needs;
- Reduce single occupancy vehicle trips by expanding alternative modes of mobility;
- Increase diversity of affordable housing options;
- Improve the quality of streams, rivers and riparian zones;
- Promote vitality in Entrance Corridors.

These priorities, which are also listed on the Request Form Instructions, are to be used to answer Criteria # 4B which states the following:

Does the project meet one of the Comprehensive Plan priorities as identified by the City of Charlottesville Planning Commission?

For the FY 2012 CIP Request Process the CIP submissions have been separated into two categories. The categories are explained below and each of these categories had a separate and distinct request form.

1. Existing Projects: The projects in this category are already included within the current 5 year CIP for FY 2011 – 2015 and have no significant changes in projected funding. These projects did not go through the full ranking process but were still thoroughly reviewed, to assess the merits of the project remaining in the Proposed FY 2012 – 2016 CIP.

2. New or Modified Projects – The projects in this category are either projects that are brand new, were requested but not approved in the FY 2011 – 2015 CIP, or were included in the FY 2011 – 2015 CIP but the amount or timing of the funding changed from what was originally projected. These projects were required to go through the full ranking and review process.

CIP submissions are received by the Budget Office in mid-September. In late September the CIP Staff Ranking Committee begins meeting to discuss, and if necessary re-rank, the requested projects. The CIP Staff Ranking Committee consists of staff members from Neighborhood Development Services, Public Works, Budget, Parks and Recreation, Public Safety, a Planning Commission member, and one member from a non-CIP requesting department, which for the FY 12 process was the Department of Finance.

The re-ranked new and modified CIP submissions, existing project CIP submissions, and recommendations from the CIP Ranking Committee are then forwarded to the CIP Budget Development Committee who then reviews all projects and their criteria scoring, and develops a CIP recommendation that reflects the fiscal realities and the overall priorities of the City and its needs. The CIP Budget Development Committee consists of the Acting City Manager, COO/CFO, Finance Director, the Director of Budget and Performance Management, the Budget and Management Analyst, and one member from the Planning Commission.

It is the final proposal from this Committee that then comes before the Planning Commission for review and feedback. For the current process, the Planning Commission will first discuss the FY 2012-2016 Proposed CIP at its November 23rd work session, followed by a public hearing at the regular meeting on December 14th.

On March 7th, the FY 2012-2016 Proposed CIP is presented to City Council as part of the FY 2012 Proposed City Operating and Schools Budget. During the next month and a half the budget is reviewed by City Council at which time City Council may make changes to the CIP. The City Budget, along with the first year of the 5 year CIP, is adopted by Council no later than April 15th.

Code of Virginia

§ 15.2-2239. Local planning commissions to prepare and submit annually capital improvement programs to governing body or official charged with preparation of budget

A local planning commission may, and at the direction of the governing body shall, prepare and revise annually a capital improvement program based on the comprehensive plan of the locality for a period not to exceed the ensuing five years. The commission shall submit the program annually to the governing body, or to the chief administrative officer or other official charged with preparation of the budget for the locality, at such time as it or he shall direct. The capital improvement program shall include the commission's recommendations, and estimates of cost of the facilities, including any road

improvement and any transportation improvement the locality chooses to include in its capital improvement plan and as provided for in the comprehensive plan, and the means of financing them, to be undertaken in the ensuing fiscal year and in a period not to exceed the next four years, as the basis of the capital budget for the locality. In the preparation of its capital budget recommendations, the commission shall consult with the chief administrative officer or other executive head of the government of the locality, the heads of departments and interested citizens and organizations and shall hold such public hearings as it deems necessary.

These projects are ones that have not been selected to receive funding or receive a lower funding amount than was requested. A brief explanation for the funding decision is provided in the notes column of this spreadsheet.

Project Evaluation and Criteria Scoring

Criteria #1 – Legal Mandate **Weight = 5**

Is the project required by actual law, regulation, court mandate, or other legal liability?

Scoring

- 5 Project is required by actual law, regulation, or court mandate, or other legal liability.
- 0 Project is not required by actual law, regulation, or court mandate, or other legal liability.

Criteria #2 – Public Health and Safety **Weight = 3**

Does the project eliminate or prevent an existing health, environmental, or safety hazard?

Scoring

- 5 Project completely eliminates or prevents an existing health, environmental, or safety hazard.
- 3 Project partially eliminates or prevents an existing health, environmental, or safety hazard.
- 0 Project does not eliminate or prevent an existing health, environmental, or safety hazard.

Criteria #3 – City Council Adopted Strategic Vision **Weight = 3**

Does the project help meet the goals of the City Council Strategic Vision?

- 5 Project does meet the goals of the City Council Strategic Vision
- 0 Project does not meet the goals of the City Council Strategic Vision

Criteria #4-A – Comprehensive Plan **Weight = 4**

Does the project help meet the goals of the City of Charlottesville’s current Comprehensive Plan?

Scoring

- 5 Project meets the goals of the City of Charlottesville’s current Comprehensive Plan.
- 0 Project does not meet the goals of the City of Charlottesville’s current Comprehensive Plan.

Criteria #4-B – Comprehensive Plan **Weight = 4**

Does the project meet one of the Comprehensive Plan priorities as identified by the City of Charlottesville Planning Commission?

Scoring

- 5 Project meets one of the Comprehensive Plan priorities as identified by the City of Charlottesville Planning Commission.
- 0 Project does not meet one of the Comprehensive Plan priorities as identified by the City of Charlottesville Planning Commission.

Criteria #5 – Infrastructure Investment / Protection **Weight = 3**

Does the project protect and preserve the City’s infrastructure?

Scoring

- 5 The project improves and / or protects the City’s infrastructure.
- 3 The project maintains the City’s current infrastructure.
- 0 The project does not protect or preserve the City’s infrastructure.

Criteria #6 – Environmental Sustainability/LEEDS Building Certification

Weight = 2

Does the project support the City of Charlottesville’s environmental sustainability goals and commitments?

Scoring

- 5 Project directly meets the City’s environmental sustainability goals/commitments (e.g., the project is directly related to a sustainability initiative and/or is committed to pursuing LEED certification for new construction or major renovations, where applicable)
- 3 Project contributes to the City’s environmental substantiality efforts
- 0 Project neither fulfills a LEED requirement nor does it contribute to the City’s environmental substantiality efforts.

Criteria #7 – Encouragement of Economic Development

Weight = 2

Will the project help stimulate development or redevelopment of properties and/or encourage economic development in the City corridors?

Scoring

- 5 The project will encourage increased economic development in the City’s corridors.
- 0 The project will not encourage increased economic development in the City’s corridors.

Criteria #8 – Impact on City Operational Finances / Revenue Generation

Weight = 1

Will the project have a positive, neutral, or negative impact on the City’s Operational Finances?

Scoring

- 5 The project will result in a positive net impact on City finances.
- 3 The project will result in a neutral net impact on City finances.
- 0 The project will result in a negative net impact on City finances.

Areas of Special Consideration

- The project has a payback schedule of 5 years or less. +3 points
- The project ties into other existing or proposed projects. +1 point
- There is demonstrated public support for the project. +1 point
- Leveraging of outside funding is available for the project. +1 point
- The project increases level of service provided by the City. +1 point
- The project will be done in partnership with another organization(s) – outside of a funding partnership which is included in the Leveraging of outside funding area of special consideration. +1 point

Scoring of CIP Projects

Each CIP Criteria will have a raw score and a weighting. The raw score measures how well a project meets the definition of the criteria. The weighting measures the relative significance of the criteria compared to other criteria. The total criteria score a project receives is calculated by multiplying the raw score by the weighting and then adding them together to produce a total criteria score for the project. The points received for the areas of special consideration are then added to the total criteria score to come up with the total project score for the CIP submission.

Proposed FY 2012 CIP Revenue and Expenditure Description Summary

Revenue Summary

Total revenues for FY 2012, **\$23,446,555**, are broken down as follows:

- 1) The General Fund transfer to the Capital Fund is proposed at a total of \$4,793,055.
- 2) FY 2010 Fund Balance Surplus funding of \$2.0 million is proposed for the FY 2012 CIP.
- 3) A contribution from Albemarle County of \$69,000 for the County's portion of expenses related to the major facility improvements at CATEC and the Central Library.
- 4) The annual \$200,000 contribution from the Charlottesville City Schools for their Small Capital Improvement Program. There is a corresponding \$200,000 project on the expenditure side for this purpose.
- 5) A contribution from the University of Virginia of \$750,000 to be used for the Fontaine Area Fire Station project.
- 6) PEG Fee revenue of \$45,000 which is received as part of the franchise agreement with Comcast.
- 7) The \$15.6 M in bond revenue is a bond issuance that will take place during CY 2012 to pay for those projects deemed bondable.

Expenditure Summary

Bondable Projects

Total expenditures for the FY 2012 Bondable projects, **\$18,935,728**, are broken down as follows:

Education

- 1) Lump Sum to Schools Proposed FY 12– \$1,100,517
This sum is the yearly appropriation to the City Schools for their Capital Program. Some of the items covered by this appropriation include: CHS Football Field Lighting Replacement; Johnson Building Envelope Restoration; Venable Restroom Reonvations; and Systemwide Interior Painting.
The balance for the lump sum to schools account as of November 11, 2010 is \$2,906,213.

- 2) Schools HVAC Replacement Plan Proposed FY 12– \$500,000
Facilities Maintenance has developed a 20-year plan for the replacement of HVAC equipment. Each piece of equipment has a predictable life cycle, beyond which failure becomes imminent. All aging equipment will be replaced with the most energy-efficient option available on the market, resulting in direct and lasting cost savings.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$764,043.
- 3) CHS Football Bleacher Replacement Proposed FY 12– \$1,200,000
The replacement of all bleachers at the CHS Football field due to steel pitting and corrosion which is common throughout both bleacher structures, and in some isolated locations, corrosion at the steel connections has advanced to the point of failure. Also, the existing bleachers are not in full compliance with current building and ADA codes. The replacement bleachers will correct this deficiency and bring the bleachers into full compliance.

Facilities Capital Improvements

- 1) Lump Sum to Facilities Capital Projects Proposed FY 12– \$1,100,517
In FY 2012, Facilities Capital Projects has been allocated a lump sum of \$1,100,517 in order to fund improvements and repairs to various City owned facilities. These include: Central Library elevator upgrades and second elevator installation; Window replacement at CATEC and the Jessup House; Circuit Court masonry and retaining wall repairs; Systemwide Facility Condition Assessments; Parks and Rec. Shop Building roof improvements; and any other repairs deemed to be necessary in order to preserve the City's properties.
The balance for lump sum to facilities account as of November 11, 2010 is \$2,281,673.
- 2) City Building HVAC Replacement Plan Proposed FY 12– \$250,000
This is a new project in FY 2012 that has not been funded in previous fiscal years. Similar to what is being done with the City Schools, Facilities Maintenance has developed a plan for the replacement of HVAC equipment. Each piece of equipment has a predictable life cycle, beyond which failure becomes imminent. All aging equipment will be replaced with the most energy-efficient option available on the market, resulting in direct and lasting cost savings.

Public Safety and Justice

- 1) Fontaine Area Fire Station Replacement Proposed FY 12– \$8,750,000
These funds will cover the cost of the design and construction of the new Fontaine Fire Station. The Fontaine Station includes the complete replacement and relocation of the existing Ivy Fire Station. Relocation of the facility, in close coordination with the

University of Virginia, will result in a facility that can provide quicker response times to a broader spectrum of the served population.

The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$3,287,098.

Transportation and Access

- 1) Undergrounding Utilities Proposed FY 12– \$100,000
The funding for Undergrounding Utilities will be used to design and construct underground utility projects coordinated with private development. These funds will be used to create partnerships with private industry where our dollars can complete a much more significant project. These funds will give the City the opportunity to complete more substantial undergrounding projects, at a very nominal cost to the City as compared to completing these projects with only City funds.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$0.

- 2) New Sidewalks Proposed FY 12 - \$300,000
This funding attempts to remedy the gaps that remain throughout the sidewalk infrastructure of the City. Priorities are given to completing the sidewalk network around schools, parks, business centers and community amenities such as libraries, post offices, etc. Project locations will be approved by the Planning Commission and City Council.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$528,853.

- 3) West Main Streetscape Proposed FY 12 - \$350,000
This project will allow the City to address design and construction of improvements to West Main Street by partnering with private developers. This funding will be used to enhance the overall look as well as the usability of West Main Street for all modes of travel (i.e., by private automobile, transit, foot, or bicycle).
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$0.

- 4) Old Lynchburg Road Improvements Proposed FY 12 - \$3,000,000
This money is for the design and construction Old Lynchburg Road (OLR) from Jefferson Park Avenue to Azalea Park. Roadway will be two-lane with curbing, sidewalk along one side and an in-road bike lane uphill from Azalea Park to JPA. Project will also consist of drainage improvements through a new storm sewer system in public right of way which in turn relieves an aging, privately- maintained storm sewer system. This project has been escalated per a commitment from City Council. All future funding for this project has been moved to FY 2012. In the FY 2011 – 2015 CIP, funding for this project was spread over three fiscal years (FY12-14).
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$10,345.

- 5) Street Reconstruction Projected FY 12 Cost – \$1,534,694
These funds will be used to repair street problems that occur during the year, such as potholes, and support additional street milling and paving projects that are a major part of maintaining the City’s aging infrastructure. This is also part of a dollar match for the over \$2,000,000 received from VDOT.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$12,051.

Parks and Recreation

- 1) Washington Park Pool/Bathhouse Proposed FY 12– \$500,000
This project is the continuation of \$1.1 million in repairs to pool and the aged bath house at the Washington Park swimming pool that began in the winter of 2008. Additional needs now include replacement of windows, roof skylights, and interior lighting. Installation of an energy efficient solar hot water system (domestic water) is proposed. Select ADA improvements will also be made to the bath house, as well as the installation of new wall tile in the showers, toilets, dressing rooms and hallways. Roof repairs, site signage, and a new bicycle rack are also included. Repairs to the pool itself began in early FY 2011 after the pool had been closed for the season.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$57,534.

- 2) McIntire Park – Master Plan Implementation Proposed FY 12– \$250,000
These funds represent a continuing commitment to set aside funds for the future development of McIntire Park. The amount of funding requested in FY 2011 and beyond is designed to be timed with the expected completion of a Master Plan for the eastern side of the park and other improvements at the interchange.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$83,648.

- 3) Rives Park Renovations Proposed FY 12– \$0
Renovations to Rives Park will be undertaken following the Park Master Plan process that was undertaken by the Parks and Recreation Department in the Fall of 2007. The park currently contains playground equipment and athletic field amenities that require replacement and/or renovation. The addition of a restroom facility in this park is also required. Funding for this project was moved from FY 2012 to FY 2013 in order to help accommodate the acceleration of the Old Lynchburg Road project.

- 4) Azalea Park Renovations Proposed FY 12– \$0
Renovations to Azalea Park will be undertaken following the Park Master Planning process that was completed in the winter of 2009-10. The park currently contains playground equipment, athletic field amenities and an off-leash dog area that require replacement and/or renovation. The addition of a restroom facility in this park is also required. Renovations to the park consistent with the adopted Master Plan will take place in a phased manner two fiscal years. Initial funding for this project was moved from FY 2012 to FY 2013 in order to help accommodate the acceleration of the Old Lynchburg Road project.

Non-bondable Projects

Total expenditures for the FY 2012 Non-Bondable projects, **\$4,051,091**, are broken down as follows:

Education

- 1) Schools Small Capital Improvements Proposed FY 12– \$200,000
This sum is to cover the some of the small capital improvement projects within the various City Schools. This expenditure item is offset by a corresponding dedicated revenue source from the Schools.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$435,363.

Economic Development

- 1) Economic Development (Strategic) Initiatives Proposed FY 12– \$250,000
The City has a history of funding a strategic investments fund so that a ready source of funds is available when unique opportunities arise. The strategic initiative funds are critical to the economic development efforts of the City. These efforts include marketing, business retention, small business support, incubator support, sponsorship of job fairs and workforce development. These funds are also used to assist in the long term strategic improvements, to grow and expand the tax base, as well as allowing the City to respond quickly to take advantage of a variety of strategic opportunities.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$1,429,228.

Neighborhood Improvements

- 1) Neighborhood CIP Funds Proposed FY 12– \$50,000
This project is lump sum CIP project money to address various neighborhood capital improvement requests. Projects are requested by residents on behalf of neighborhood betterment and completed in accordance with City Procurement Guidelines. This program allows for funds to be used for various capital projects solicited by neighborhoods or determined as needed by Council that are not otherwise covered in the traffic calming/sidewalk/drainage programs. This project was reduced from the \$100,000 budget in the FY 2011 CIP due to the fact that it is now being done as a 50/50 cost share between the City and the neighborhoods requesting the projects.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$96,925.

Facilities Capital Improvements

- 1) CATEC – General Facility Maintenance Proposed FY 12– \$32,619
This amount is the annual appropriation for improvements to the Charlottesville-Albemarle Technical Education Center. This appropriation is required by an agreement between the Charlottesville City School System and Albemarle County.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$135,598.

Transportation and Access

- 1) Sidewalk Repair and Improvements Proposed FY 12– \$212,180
This project funds the repair of the City’s existing sidewalks. Sidewalk repairs are necessary to keep existing infrastructure safe and hazard free and are necessary for completion of the pedestrian network which in turn is needed to balance sound transportation alternatives. When the tripping hazards, gaps, and broken sidewalks are repaired it helps to minimize the liability of the City.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$621,239.
- 2) State Bridge Inspections Proposed FY 12– \$125,000
This project is the continuation of the required State inspections of the various bridges throughout the City. VDOT requires bridge inspection reports on numerous structures be submitted annually. Previously this project was combined with the Minor Bridge Repair project under the title State Bridge and Highway Priorities. The projects were separated to show the true cost of doing inspections and the cost of bridge maintenance.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$794,643, which includes both Bridge Inspection and Bridge Repair funding.
- 3) Minor Bridge Repairs Proposed FY 12– \$200,000
This is a new project that was previously combined with the Minor Bridge Repair project under the title State Bridge and Highway Priorities. The projects were separated to show the true cost of doing inspections and the cost of bridge maintenance. This project is the continuation of the required maintenance of the various bridges throughout the City. This request is for lump sum CIP project money to rehab/maintain citywide bridge projects.
- 4) City Match Requirement for CAT Transit Bus Replacement Proposed FY 12– \$349,134
The matching funds are to leverage Federal and State capital grant funding for bus purchases. In FY 2012, CAT Bus & Bus-Related Purchases will include: 2 Trolleys, 2 Hybrid Buses, and one mini-bus. For cost projections it is assumed that the federal share is 80 percent, the state share is 4 percent, and the City share is 16 percent.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$638,340.
- 5) Intelligent Transportation System Proposed FY 12– \$100,000
This project money is programmed to complete the citywide ITS project. The project coordinates the citywide signal system on priority basis of business corridors. The project includes additional cameras and/or variable message boards. The benefits of this project could be more efficient traffic flow on business corridors; minimizing cut-through traffic in neighborhoods; relieving congestion; and making pedestrian and bike travel safer.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$188,589.
- 6) City Wide Traffic Improvements Proposed FY 12– \$100,000
This CIP project money will be used to address various traffic issues and neighborhood traffic calming issues. Projects would include re-striping pavements, reconfiguring intersections, rephasing traffic signals, and other creative retrofitting to existing

operations in lieu of building new roads. All potential projects will be discussed at Traffic Meetings to include NDS, police, fire, parks/trails planner, and public works. Traffic calming projects would be approved by residents and completed in accordance with the adopted Traffic Calming Guidelines.

The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$232,889.

- 7) Citywide ADA Improvements - Sidewalks and Curbs Proposed FY 12– \$100,000

This project would provide handicapped accessibility at various locations throughout the City allowing the City to meet federally required guidelines for handicapped access.

The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$253,236.

- 8) Bicycle Infrastructure Proposed FY 12– \$50,000

This project addresses various bicycle access and safety issues on City streets. Potential projects will be vetted through the Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Committee as well as at Traffic Meetings to include NDS, police, fire, parks/trails planner, and public works. Projects would include re-striping pavements, reconfiguring intersections, additional bicycle detection at traffic signals, signing, and other creative retrofitting to existing streets.

The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$35,495.

Parks and Recreation

- 1) Parks and Schools Playground Renovations Proposed FY 12– \$106,090

This project includes the replacement of the City Parks playground equipment and of playground equipment at Charlottesville City School Parks, to ensure user safety and comply with current codes. Several of the City and School's playgrounds are currently not in compliance with the National Playground Safety Code. This project will provide improved safety for the residents who use playgrounds daily.

The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$73,075.

- 2) Trails and Greenway Development Proposed FY 12– \$79,568

This project is the result of reallocated capital funds at the direction of City Council in February 2006. Parks and Recreation is currently managing this program and has moved forward on a number of fronts, new construction through Safe Routes to School funds around Buford Middle School and at Venable School, in McIntire Park along the 250 bypass for a commuter trail, and the improvement of connections to existing trails through the site plan review process. Trails were the # 1 priority as defined by the citizens in a citizen survey conducted as part of the Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment in 2005.

The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$75,902. (Represents unallocated balance – over \$1.3 million reserved for specific trail projects)

- 3) Urban Tree Preservation and Planting Proposed FY 12– \$51,500

The protection of the Urban Tree Canopy has a direct affect upon air quality, stormwater management and quality of life for City residents and is a highly held value among residents of the City. These funds are used for preventive work and the preservation of

the tree canopy, through finalizing a street tree inventory in the city, assessing problem trees and further defining action strategies toward the protection of the tree canopy. Working with the Institute for Environmental Negotiation at the University of Virginia, Parks and Recreation Staff and the Urban Forester have begun drafting an Urban Forest Management Plan, scheduled to be completed by the end of 2008. These funds will also be used for the procurement of replacement trees and the planting of new trees in areas of where invasive species are prevalent and along riparian buffers to enhance water quality and stormwater management strategies.

The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$313,475.

- 4) Parkland Acquisition Proposed FY 12– \$100,000
These funds will be used to pursue land acquisition opportunities to preserve open space, protect natural resources and improve riparian buffers and provide future trail connections.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$344,739.

Stormwater Initiatives

- 1) Neighborhood Drainage Projects Proposed FY 12– \$175,000
These funds are used to partner with City property owner funding to solve neighborhood drainage and flooding issues on residential properties that have never been budgeted on their own merit before. Cost participation by City residents makes the City funds go further.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$96,508.
- 2) Stormwater Initiatives Proposed FY 12– \$600,000
These funds will be used to address the strategic inspection and rehabilitation of the existing public stormwater infrastructure. The City has an aging stormwater infrastructure (consisting of over 50 miles of pipes) and currently approximately 13 miles of corrugated metal and vitrified clay pipes have been identified as being in need of immediate repair or replacement based on deterioration of the pipes. Funds will also be use to increase the capacity of the stormwater system, where additional capacity is deemed necessary. In previous CIP's, FY 2012 was the final year of funding this project at the \$600,000 level, at which point the discussion on implementing a Stormwater Utility Fee would be revisited. However, an additional year of \$600,000 level funding has been added in FY 2013 given the continued uncertainly or probability of revisiting the Stormwater Utility fee within the next year.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$439,926.

Technology Infrastructure

- 1) Communications Technology Account/
Public Access Television Proposed FY 12– \$45,000
This funding will allow the City to continue upgrading and improving its cable network services and programming to the citizens by providing technology equipment and maintenance of that equipment to the Public Access Offices at CATEC; providing technology and equipment to Channel 10 located in City Hall.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$35,684.

Other Governmental Commitments

- 1) Charlottesville Housing Fund Proposed FY 12– \$1,000,000
The mission of this program, as adopted by City Council’s Housing Advisory Committee in November 2006, is to meet the housing challenges facing our residents by dedicating, consolidating and expanding financial support for the preservation and production of affordable housing in our community. The City is working to accomplish the goal adopted by Council in February 2010 for growing of supported affordable housing stock to 15% of overall housing stock by 2025. Any additional funding necessary to meet the funding amounts presented in the report that was adopted by Council on February 1, 2010 will come from CDBG (\$400,000) and HOME fund (\$120,000).
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$1,276,629.

- 2) Home Energy Conservation Grant Program Proposed FY 12– \$125,000
The Home Energy Conservation Grant Program is a grant/loan program for residential owner-occupied housing that would fund energy conservation measures for the recipients by either providing a grant to low income families, or a low interest loan to non low income families, as incentive for energy conservation. The intent of the program is to provide savings on utilities; to facilitate low income families to be able to afford energy saving measures; and to reduce the usage of nonrenewable energy.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$241,393.

- 3) YMCA Pool – City Share Proposed FY 12– \$0
The City’s Ground Lease with the YMCA states that if City commits to a future capital contribution of \$1,250,000 for construction of the family aquatics center, then the YMCA agrees to include at least six yard competitive swimming lanes and a one meter board and diving well and give the Charlottesville High School swim team priority access to those six lanes. In FY 2011 half of the required match (\$625,000) was budgeted. The remainder of the funding has been moved from FY 2012 to FY 2013 to align with the YMCA construction schedule.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$625,000.

CIP Contingency Account

- 1) CIP Contingency Account Proposed FY 12– \$459,737
The CIP Contingency account is used to make up for funding shortfalls associated with any CIP project and reflects 2% of proposed project funding. Shortfalls could be caused by a variety of factors, such as a rise in fuel costs, an unexpected change in scope of a project or a non-competitive bidding market which causes bids to come in over what was originally budgeted for the project. The CIP Contingency account is also used for emergency projects that arise throughout the fiscal year.
The balance for this project as of November 11, 2010 is \$3,605,943.
